
The Family & Children First Council (FCFC) of Cuyahoga County is part of the Greater Cleveland Children of Incarcerated Parents (CIP) Coalition.

Kids and teens who have a mom or dad who is incarcerated often experience more everyday challenges than their peers.

Parental incarceration disrupts the lives of one in 50 children in the United States. For black children, the rate is one in 15.\* But the right responses and support can help children have a positive future.





Children who have an incarcerated parent may suffer a range of negative consequences, including financial hardship, behavioral issues, social stigma, and poor academic performance. Similarly, they may need a range of services and supports. We help your agency connect children and teens to:

- positive social activities to reduce isolation from peers and social stigma
- academic supports if grades begin to fall
- prevention or intervention services for risk behaviors like drug use, violence, or pregnancy
- or other services depending on the child's need.
