- 1. Individual assessment and development of a Family Participation Plan which identifies an individual's plan (with specific steps identified) to increase and improve the amount of involvement he has with his child/ren; case management services will follow to provide coaching and assistance;
- 2. Parenting group education to teach new skills and to develop peer-topeer mentoring relationships among the group's participants based on parenting experience.
- 3. Individual and group family programming with fathers and their child/ren.

The MVPF initiative will target incarcerated men in pre-release and jail locations in two counties, fathers from the general community wishing to engage their children in more positive

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ways in nine counties, and young men of middle school ages that are in danger of becoming premature fathers in Ironton-Lawrence County CAO one county.

Primary MVPF program services in-

- 1. The Nurturing Fathers for Life (NFL) program curriculum and Wise Guys premature fatherhood prevention program curriculum;
- 2. Program participants will be provided added support through monthly support group meetings and ongoing case management;
- 3. Activities that encourage fathers to get engaged with their children and their community through monthly father-child activities and community volunteer opportunities.

WSOS Community Action Commission (WSOS), based in Huron County, will be the lead agency for the **Father** Connection program in Region 6. The region encompasses nine Ohio counties: Seneca, Huron, Wyandot, Crawford, Richland, Ashland, Marion, Morrow, and Knox. WSOS will serve fathers in the region in partnership with other community action agencies. The program will target married, unmarried, non-custodial fathers and cohabitating fathers. The goals will be to assist fathers and their children in building positive and strong relationships.
