OPNFF 2005 Regional Father's Day Public Awareness Events

The Ohio Practitioners Network for Fathers and Families is sponsoring Fathers Day events to promote public awareness for the importance of fatherhood in four of our five regions: Northwest, West, East and South. No event will be sponsored in the Northeast Region as it would conflict with the Cuyahoga County Fatherhood Initiatives "Celebration of Fatherhood". An organizational member of OPNFF is the lead agency in each region.

- Northwest Region: The Lima Allen Council on Community Affairs (LACCA), a Head Start agency, is sponsoring a Father/Child Tee Ball event on June 18 The event targets families participating in LACCA and Help Me Grow programs and is also be open to the community-at-large.
- East Region: Muskingum County DadsCount is sponsoring an essay contest about fathers and hosting a community-wide Fathers Day celebration. The Zanesville Times Recorder is co-host for the essay contest. There are six essay categories, targeting the various roles played by fathers: outdoorsmen, servicemen,

coaches, educators, businessmen, and spiritual leaders. Fathers in each category will receive prizes by drawing. All essays and fathers will be acknowledged. The community-wide event will honor fathers, promote healthy fatherhood and local resources at Zanesville Family Y on June 18.

South Region Services United for Mothers and Adolescents (SUMA) is sponsor of the first annual city-wide 2005 Celebration of Fatherhood and Father of the Year event in Cincinnati. The goal of the event is to debunk the myth that low income fathers are not actively involved with children. The event will engage the business community and the general population in the nomination of Fathers of the Year and Father-Friendly businesses. There will be four categories of awards, targeting different sectors of the community. The Celebration of Fatherhood is being held at Old St. George Church and will become an annual event.

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ODRC FAMILY PROGRAM IS UP AND RUNNING

The Children of Incarcerated Parents Program builds on Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction's commitment to reentry by encouraging family members to participate in prison-based programming with their incarcerated loved one, while accessing additional resources and wraparound services in partnership with community agencies.

The primary goal of this initiative is to assist the offender and his family in strengthening family relationships in an effort to keep their children from taking the same path in life.

The three pilot sites, Dayton, London and Richland Correctional Facilities are partnering with three lead Agencies. The agencies, Talbert House, Alvis House and the Center for Families and Children of Cleveland provide family case planning and coordinate services for families struggling with an incarcerated father.

West Region: The Ohio Department of Rehabilitation and Correction (ODRC) is sponsor of two days of Father's Day events at two separate facilities, the Ross Correctional Institution and the Corrections Medical Center. One day features fatherhood workshops and motivational speakers for inmates and the second day features a variety of special visitation activities for incarcerated fathers and their children.

Father's Day is rarely celebrated by father's in prison and budgets do not allow for specific programming. Inmate's often experience the day in sober silence. Like their fathers, kids often spend fathers day away from their Dads and in silence. It is anticipated that approximately 50 to 100 kids will be involved in the two programs.

I was a co-presenter at an Ohio Practitioners Network for Fathers and Families (OPNFF) training in Columbus for community-based professionals who worked with children and families. The day was spent discussing fatherhood and parenting, the fatherhood movement, introducing the Nurturing Father curriculum and sampling two of the sessions from the curriculum. Clearly, the discussion of fatherhood touched all participants in a variety of meaningful ways and for many different reasons. One participant was greatly moved by exploring the experience with her father, and the impact that it has on her life today. To what extent is the father necessary? The following is an excerpt from an e-mail that I received from that participant on the next day:

"...I just wanted to say how much I enjoyed the Nurturing Fathers workshop. What an awesome insight you have on parenting and relationships. I have come to realize that not only are fathers essential to our young women, but also are crucial to our young men's development in becoming great husbands and fathers. When dealing with my own hurt as well as other young women who are hurting from the absence of their father, the revelation came to me that not only is this relationship imperative to a young women's emotional stability and growth into a healthy functional adult...but this relationship is symbolic in the fact that our (women's) wedding day represents everything that as children we are supposed to receive from our father: all of the protection, love, security, guidance...even being provided for is now given from our father to our husband. We are given to this man by our father with his

blessing, trusting that this man will now take over his responsibility of loving, protecting and providing for us. In turn, we honor, respect and look to our husbands for stability and strength to The little things? make crucial decisions concerning our families in the same way that we would look to our fathers. I was amazed at how important this relationship is and how it can affect people's self esteem and their ability to love, trust, and even become stable adults. I wish that there were more men doing what you do, it is absolutely phenomenal and I honor you and pray for your success in doing this on a national level. It will ultimately benefit our families".
